

Letter From the President

Dear Friend,

2019 was truly a year of great change, challenge and growth for the Milwaukee Rescue Mission!

Despite a robust economy and historically low unemployment rates, 2019 brought more struggling men, women and children to our doors than ever before. Yes, homelessness remains a complicated thing. It can be the result of so many different factors like poverty, addiction, mental illness, inadequate education, lack of job skills and trauma—the list can go on and on.

Through it all, though, we remain steadfast in our core mission to help the hurting and lost. Since 1893, we have been humbled by the faithfulness of our God and our caring community in helping us stay the course of serving those in need.

One way in which God has used our caring community to continue our mission is through the wise leadership of our Board of Directors. God has blessed us with leaders who care deeply for those who are hurting in our community—leaders like our dear friend and long-time board member, Bill Eisner, who passed away in November of 2019. We miss Bill greatly, but we thank God for the incredible leadership, compassion and friendship he provided over many years.

With great prayer and consideration, we are always trying to find ways to refine our programs and better address the needs of the surrounding community. Whether it's revamping our recovery programs, renovating our spaces or expanding classes at our K4-12th grade school, Cross Trainers Academy, we're constantly taking a fresh look to make our programs as effective as possible.

When we opened Door of Hope—our shelter space for women unaccompanied by dependent children—in 2018, we were responding to a critical need we saw in the community. After renovating some existing space at our Main Campus, we were able to offer 12 beds to meet this need. In the past year, we've increased the number of beds available to this population to 22! Not only can more women now find safe shelter, nutritious meals and clean clothing, they also have access to recovery programs that offer education, job-training, counseling and more.

One thing that hasn't changed is that we rely exclusively on the generosity of our community to continue these life-changing programs. Through God's grace and the support of friends like you, hundreds of men, women and children receive critical support every day here at MRM—and thousands were given the hope of life transformation in 2019!

As I reflect on the past year and all that has happened here at the Milwaukee Rescue Mission, I am so grateful for all God has done through the support of friends like you! Thank you for your caring about the well-being of every precious soul who comes through our doors for help. You are a blessing!

100% of New Journey grads found work in livable wage jobs within six months.

226 men participated in Community Outreach Services, which helps men with an income find stable housing and other services.

135 men participated in **Vocational Initiative Services**, which supports men who are employed by connecting them with other resources. 32 men enrolled in **New Journey**, our year-long residency program focused on addiction recovery, work readiness and healthy lifestyles. 17 **New Journey** grads participated in our yearlong transitional living program, **New Journey Transitional Services.**

100 women participated in Joy House's **transformative programs**, which include job training and financial education.

133 children ages 0-4 received loving care in the Joy House **nursery**.
